The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Chairman Egen. Roll was called and there was a quorum.

A caution was entered by the Chairman as to restrict the use of electronic devices during the meetings, as per the Open Meetings Act.

Motion was made by H. Nels to approve the agenda, seconded by W. Conner; it was suggested to adjust the meeting by moving agenda item 6.2 Awards Committee report to 8.2 so M. Lavoy could make an up to date report and it was passed, with that change.

Approval of Minutes of June 14th, 2023 Meeting: Motion made by M. Humphries, seconded by W. Conner to approve, and passed.

Public Comment #1: S. Donovan announced the nut sale fund raiser is currently ongoing.

Committee Updates: Executive: Chairman Egen said the group has not met.

Building Committee: There are opportunities that are being pursued through county & business network and Director Clark said the outlook was positive. This will continue, and will be reported when action is achieved.

Historical Markers Committee: Chairman Potter requested a meeting tonight. The city of Monroe has taken four markers to install themselves. Another trip to Sewah foundry is forthcoming.

Projects Grant Committee: Chairman Humphries said there were six applications for a total of \$80,000 while the ceiling is \$60,000. The committee will meet soon for discussion and recommendations.

Spirit of Service Awards Committee (became 6.6 instead of 8.2): Chairperson M. LaVoy said she has received the applications and the committee is reviewing now. A final draft will be presented to the board in August.

New Business: Staff Reports: T. Heywood made the motion for the reports be passed as presented, seconded by M. Humphries, and passed.
There was discussion concerning the museum's full use of the materials (including the bound newspapers) from the Monroe Evening News/Monroe News/Gannett. Director Clark will contact the county legal counsel for guidance.

Old Business: Strategic Vision Plan: Vice-Chairman J. Potter started a conversation concerning revisiting the Plan, and with Director Clark it was suggested that there be quarterly refocusing & evaluations, or end of the year, or a March/Sept. work session only, with no official action being taken. J. Potter made a motion to address this and add to the calendar, seconded by M. Humphries and it passed unanimously.

Public Comment #2: S. Donovan outlined activities of the organization and her concerns.

Board Comments: General encouraging comments. Chairman Egen announced that past Director Matt Switlik had been given the state of Michigan 'MACK' award by the Michigan Historical Commission. This was done last month at Lansing.

2023 Spirit of Service Awards

OVERVIEW

About the Awards

Established in 2018, the Spirit of Service Awards are presented by the Monroe County Museum System's Board of Trustees and honors individuals, groups, and scholars who have significantly contributed to the field of local history in Monroe County.

Award Categories

Illumination Award

The service of this **individual** has made a lasting contribution or impact on the history and community of Monroe County. Their service is clearly recognized and valued by peers, community members, and community leaders for their dedication and accomplishments. (This award may be granted posthumously though the preference is to recognize living individuals.)

Connection Award

This award honors a **school, organization, or municipal body** that has demonstrated service to the field of local history through a commitment of time and energy that has actively engaged the wider community through heritage stewardship.

Exploration Award

This award recognizes a scholarly publication, project, or initiative that has contributed towards a better understanding of Monroe County's history.

Publications should appear in a magazine, periodical, or book from a reputable publisher. Online articles will be considered as long as they are part of a reputable publisher and not the product of a personal blog or website. Publication must have occurred within the previous five years.

Projects may take a variety of forms such as an archaeological dig, new exhibit, phone app, preservation efforts, etc. However, they must be related to a Monroe County site or personage.

Eligibility

There is no residency requirement but the focus of the individual or group receiving the award must have primarily occurred or be located within the historical or current boundaries of Monroe County, Michigan. For projects within historical boundaries of Monroe County, it must have happened when that location or personage was part of Monroe County. (For example, a publication about the history of Port Lawrence Township, Michigan would be acceptable. A publication primarily about Toledo, Ohio, which now occupies Port Lawrence, would not.)

Service to a historical site or by a historical society must have occurred within the current boundaries of Monroe County, Michigan.

Current members of the Monroe County Board of Commissioners, Monroe County Museum System Board of Trustees, or current County of Monroe employees cannot be nominated in the Illumination or Connection Award categories. The above groups may be eligible for an Exploration Award if the project is separate from their day-to-day duties and responsibilities.

Award recipients are not eligible for renomination within five years.

The Spirit of Service Awards Committee may use a previous year's nomination for any category.

Submission Guidelines

All applications for the Spirit of Service Awards are due September 30, 2023.

All applications must be submitted electronically to the Monroe County Museum Director, Andrew Clark, at andy_clark@monroemi.org.

Supplemental materials such as newspaper clippings, magazine articles, etc that support the nomination should be attached to the application as a pdf or jpeg. Website links may be included in the body of the email of the application. (Website links should be free to access.) No letters of support please.

Awards Process

All nominations will be reviewed by Spirit of Service Awards Committee. The committee will then make their recommendations to the Monroe County Museum System Board of Trustees for approval.

Awards can be granted annually. The public awards program will take place every other year.

Organizational Operations

County Museum: Public access to the galleries at the County Museum are Tuesdays through Saturdays, 10 am to 5 pm, and Sundays, 12 pm to 5 pm.

County Archives: Research is by appointment and via phone, mail, and email.

Territorial Park: Operating hours for building access are Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays, 10 am to 4 pm. Site was closed for Fair Week. *Seasonal operations conclude on September 2nd.*

Vietnam Veterans Memorial and Museum: Operating hours for building access is Saturdays, 10 am to 4 pm. Site was closed for Fair Week. *Seasonal operations conclude on September 2nd.*

St Antoine's Historic Site: Grounds are open year round.

Maintenance and Operations

Museum and Archives

No significant projects have occurred.

Staff and I have been monitoring with a small degree of wonder and amusement the lone stalk of corn that is growing behind the museum.

Territorial Park

Pears have dropped for the year and the apples are looking decent.

St Antoine's Historic Site Memorial

County Parks and Recreation trimmed some trees in the park and around the St Antoine's historical marker.

Exhibits

Our Sturgeon Exhibit was once again displayed in the South Exhibit Hall during Fair Week. Unlike previous years, the exhibit stayed upright during its entire time ... until I started to take it down on Saturday evening. If staffing levels remain stable for Fair Week next year, we should be able to once again post someone there for most of the week to engage with fairgoers.

Our pencils, blank notebooks, and copies of *Monroe's Other Generals* all proved to be popular with fairgoers. Unfortunately, rack cards proved to be as popular as Brussel sprouts. Many thanks to Heather for once again coordinating our booth giveaways.

The new fencing in the Tool Barn exhibit appeared to be well received by teens attending the fair as it provided them with a sturdy support to lean against while they sat on the floor of the exhibit. I would like to think they gained a greater appreciation of 19th and 20th century agricultural implements.

Many thanks to Robert for handling the installation of the exhibit case and artifacts inside Eby House for the duration of Fair Week.

Historical Projects Fund

For 2023, the Historical Projects Fund received six applications totaling \$81,026. The Genealogical Society of Monroe County, the Labor Museum, and the River Raisin Centre for the Arts are all first time applicants.

Spirit of Service Awards

The 2023 application has been updated and is attached to the packet for approval. Once approved it will be posted on our website, on Facebook, distributed to local historical organizations, and sent to area media outlets. Deadline for nominations will be September 30, 2023.

Markers Program

Museum staff have not installed any markers recently but City Parks and Recreation have installed the first of four markers deposited with them. *Waterloo Dam 1820* really pops out after being applied with the new blue and silver paint scheme.

Staff have removed six additional markers for refurbishment: *British Victory at Frenchtown* at Heck Park, *Sandy Creek Settlement* at Sterling State Park, *University of Michigan, 1838* at the County Courthouse, *Bridge School: First Public School in*

Michigan at the Raisinville Township Hall, *Deloeuil Blacksmith Shop* on the River Raisin, and *Boyd School* on Third Street. These six markers along with “*War*” *with a Happy Ending*, which was removed previously, will be dropped off at Sewah Studios next week. All posts were kept in place with the exception of the *Boyd School* marker; it had suffered enough deterioration at the base that the post more or less collapsed during the removal process.

Old Michigan Southern, *Colonel Oliver Johnson's Home*, *Memorial Place*, and *LaZBoy/Knabusch* will be liberated from Ohio late next week.

Fair Week

Once again many thanks to the staff and volunteers that worked on various fronts to make our contribution to Fair Week possible. Our seven day run on the Fairgrounds once a year is an all hands on deck effort and no single person could pull it off on their own. Volunteers from the Old Mill Museum, DAR, and Monroe County Historical Society joined us at various points of the week taking either full or partial hosting shifts. Brian and Jody should be specially recognized for taking the time over the course of several days before and during the event to help train our first time presenters as well as engaging visitors with mid-19th century woodworking techniques. Of course, I have great personal appreciation to JJ for having fully adopted the Fair Week monkey and for providing it with proper care and feeding.

Fair week:

Throughout the month, staff and I invested time in all focus areas for our unique and significant opportunity to cultivate our community's curiosity on a large scale at the Eby Log House. A general sample of work performed within my universe includes:

- Staff training (historic foodways and 19th c. timber framing).
- Outfitting staff in period clothing (some new clothing, some alterations to existing garments/accessories).
- Tool restoration (bringing back 19th c. carpentry tools from the dead: edge restoration, new handles, protective leather sheaths, etc. (Also repair and adjustment of our schnitzelbank).
- Kitchen/foodways prep (thorough clean of 1860s kitchen equipment and placement at the Eby house, and establishment of a food storage/supply plan).
- General house furnishing: all furnishings big and small placed and arranged throughout the month.
- Acquisition of cedar stumps (thanks Andy!) and movement of logs to the Eby front yard from RRTP (thanks Josh and Travis!)
- Material culture research and development for the interior vignette (new window dressings, the addition of canning supplies, and the insertion of a delightful smattering of high-quality reproduction goods).
- Thanks to the efforts of many MCMS staff, the site and overall educational program was readied on time and in good order, despite aggressively hot weather the week before the fair. Significant work included the creation of new barriers, and deep cleaning of the tool barn.

Outreach:

- On Friday, July 22, I participated in a living history event hosted by the Carleton branch of the MCLS. I demonstrated 19th century shake making alongside other reenactors of various time periods. Thanks to Makenzie Jacobs for organizing the event.

Miscellany:

- On Thursday, July 13, I participated in a radio interview with Bobb Vergiels. We discussed many things.
- On Wednesday, July 26, we held a fair week volunteer orientation at the museum. Thanks to all the volunteers, representing numerous organizations throughout our community for their commitment to lend a hand.
- On Thursday, July 27, RRTP received its annual treatment for poison ivy.
- Thanks to Jody Egen for the tremendous assistance during the historic foodways training on Wednesday, July 26.

- Thanks to Chairman Egen for assistance in filling out the 1860 vignette.
- Thanks to Jim Johnson for the loan of the Mrs. Parker's Geranium!
- Thanks again to Trustee Trujillo for regularly providing used coffee grounds to aid in the ongoing battle to keep rabbits out of our crops.

LOCAL HISTORY DIVISION Report
For July, 2023

We were open by appointment with 16 visitors, 5 walk-ins and about 20 GSMC members.

Research topics this month included: WWII veterans, family quilt, family history, Willard family, Baker family, River Raisin Masonry, 'all and everything Monroe', one-room schoolhouse, Dundee area, Bordine, Darling, Hardy families, Boyd house, prohibition in Monroe county

Rachel processed 40 obits from 10 requests. She handled 6 phone call requests and 12 emails. Surnames included Nettleton, Goans, Hulbert, Williams, Fling, Lang, Bruckner, Conboy. She assisted at the front desk as needed, also working on the weekends.

Robert had 11 outside calls and answered 18 emails. He had success in transferring items not Monroe County to other institutions including St. Joseph County Historical Society, Grand Rapids Public Library, Port O'Plymouth Museum (NC), Racine (WI) Heritage Museum, Chicago Public Library, Ironwood Historical Society, Allegan County Historical Society, Three Oaks (MI) Museum, Mitchell Research Center in Hillsdale MI.

He transported and set up a German exhibit to the Eby Log Cabin at the fairgrounds. Processed a large group (159) of FIC photographs (we keep finding them!!) and processed misc. FIC items including Kohler bowling items, merchandise of W. G. Fielder of Steiner MI, milk glass light covers, early Country Store volunteer book, cheese wheel boxes, silverware, box from Kessel's Fashion shop, plaques and more.

Guest Services Division Report ♦ July 2023

The Monroe County Museum hosted 326 visitors in the month of July: 226 adults and 100 youths. The most popular visitation day was Wednesday, bringing 95 visitors to the Museum.

- Papermill School is open to visitors every Thursday, Friday, and Saturday for the summer season. In July, 294 people visited the building.
- 19 people visited the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Museum in July.
- Oliver Brown departed Guest Services in late July.

The office was painted, which gave me a chance to reorganize, repurpose, and refigure the space. The color is soothing and makes the room feel larger and brighter, and moving and removing furniture helped with the overall flow. The “break room” area was completely overhauled, resulting in a very organized and calming space.
