The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM.

Chairman Egen welcomed new BoT trustee Sue Wagers

Mike Humphries took roll.

Motions were made to approve the agenda and the last meeting's minutes. Both were passed unanimously with no discussion, and there was no public comment.

Discussion was turned over to Projects Committee Chair Mike Humphries and Director Clark. The Historical Society has asked for an extension on the project fund previously approved in 2022 for painting of the Johnson-Phinney house. Andy Clark referenced a letter sent in May asking for the extension. Further detailing the situation, he continued that current MCHS president Bill Saul provided an update on the project and indicated that plans were in place to have it completed this year. Andy continued that at that time it was discussed that if another extension is granted, it would be the final extension, with a firm deadline of May 2025. Mike stated that the Projects Committee had not met formally since that meeting, and agreed that a firm deadline would be necessary, while expressing continued support for the project, and explaining that a deadline of May 2025 is more than reasonable.

L William Conner stated the importance of both adhering to prescribed rules, and building a positive relationship with organizations like the MCHS. Chairman Egen agreed, and stated that another extension

would be an act of good faith in the spirit of cooperation toward a community organization that has acted in good faith toward the MCMS.

Mike proposed a motion to extend the grant to the MCHS with the caveat that this will be the final extension, and that work must be completed by the end of May 2025. After some discussion between L. William Conner, Michelle LaVoy, and Chairman Egen, the motion was revised to the following: Extend the grant offering to the MCHS, with note that this is not to be considered a precedent-setting event, with a firm deadline for all work to be completed by May 31, 2025. The motion was supported by L. William Conner, and the motion was passed unanimously.

There was no public comment.

During board comments, Michelle LaVoy expressed thanks and congratulations to everyone involved in the SoS Award Ceremony event, which inspired hearty agreements and supportive remarks from several other trustees. Other trustees expressed anticipation of Octobernight, and Sue Wagers shared news of several local history projects. Chairman Egen again expressed welcome to new Trustee Sue Wagers, and asked that the service of former Trustee Mary Strevel be formally recognized in great appreciation of her years of service to the MCMS.

Michelle LaVoy made a motion to adjourn, it was supported by Mike Humphries, and was passed unanimously.

Museum and Archives

Deputy Director's Report

Friday, September 6, through Friday, November 2, 2024

Octobernight and an Eerie Series:

- This year's *Octobernight* (held Oct 4-5) proved to be the best since the re-imaging of the former *Lantern Tours*. Visitor attendance closely matched previous years, visitor vehicle and foot traffic was safe and smooth, and our combined team of staff, volunteers, and contractors executed a memorable and meaningful seasonal educational experience for those brave enough to venture into the shadows. Notable adjustments this year were successful refinement of the SFX matrix, the expansion of "unattached" jumpscare, a new and improved barn setting from floors to centerpieces, and the addition of beverage services provided by Nocturnal. Even though setup and strike continue to be substantial all-consuming endeavors, ongoing planning and coordination make the process a little bit less of a black hole each year.
- This year we expanded seasonal offerings to create an *Eerie Series* of events for our community. *Octobernight* led the array, flanked by a special edition of *YesterWays* throughout October (Victorian hair crafting), and *Shadowed Sips: Dramatic Readings of Historic Halloween*, held at Nocturnal each week. In addition, we participated in the *Downtown Trick-or-Treat* on Saturday October 26, offering the first 1,100 trick-or-treaters special halloween starter kits including an MCMS tote bag, coloring books, crayons, and other assorted goodies.
- We are happy to recognize the service of a small army of volunteers, contractors, and partners whose generosity and talents combined made the *Eerie Series* a successful endeavor. They are: Chairman Brian Egen, Trustee Mike Humpries and family, Trustee L. Many thanks as well to all staff of the MCMS who participated in *Octobernight* for dutifully answering the summons for substantial and special spookie-services.

Territorial Park:

- A new wooden barn floor was completed in the days prior to the SoS Award Ceremony on Wednesday September 18. Full removal of the floor after the initial observations revealed nothing surprising; the two center joists had failed catastrophically, and about 10% of the total sill area was rotten. While some termite activity was observed, the chief cause of the problems was water intrusion, concentrated in the eastern end. Taking this opportunity to repair *and* improve the structure, a third joist was added to the floor's center, and support boards were sistered along the full length of the damaged sills, supported nicely on the existing concrete footers. All the new support wood was pressure-treated in contrast to the old, and new concrete bases were installed to bolster the cinder-blocks, which formerly rested directly on the ground. The better materials and improved support will contribute greatly toward the longevity of this new floor system, together with currently-in-place pest control measures. The previous floorboards were mortised on both edges and joined by a long biscuit of timber. The new ones received larger mortises, joined with a well-fit biscuit of plywood, with the intention of greater lifespan as the fresh wood wiggles around in its new home. All modern lumber and fasteners were hidden, and the floor was nailed with era-appropriate cut spikes. Special thanks to Mike for the assistance with this project.

The sandstone floor on either side of the threshing floor was removed after the SoS Awards Ceremony and replaced with gravel. The sandstone had endured far too many wagon wheels over the years, creating an increasingly hazardous surface. The gravel is admittedly ahistorical, but then again so is the price of laying limestone slabs, the optimal flooring choice. When other, more pressing heavy restoration work is completed throughout RRTP, we can revisit options for the stone floor, but for now I'm happy that we had a safe surface for staff and volunteers in time for *Octobernight*.

- At the time of this writing, the kitchen is undergoing a restoration effort. A decision was made to investigate the possibility of repairing long-term issues earlier in the season, and following minimally-invasive explorations into the structure's interior, a plan was made to begin repair after *Octobernight*. New cedar siding was delivered Tuesday, October 8, and following site prep, work began in earnest on Wednesday, October 23. At this time, the project is about 50% completed: major work has been finished on the building's western sill and wall, and new siding and a roof are in-process, following new sheathing on the lower end, and new window and door casings. A detailed report of the restoration will be included in my next report. Special thanks to Andy, Mike, Josh Satkowski, Chairman Egen, and others for their support, assistance, and consultation.

Miscellany:

- Thanks to everyone who assisted in the Spirit of Service Awards ceremony, held Wednesday, September 18 at Territorial Park.
- Participation in *One Book, One Community of Monroe County* is ongoing.
- Preparation for *Christmas with the Monroe County Museum* is ongoing. As in past years, plans are in place for a Santa's-toy-bag-assortment of fun educational holiday offerings.
- *YesterWays*, our hands-on drop-in Saturday activity at the museum usually reserved for January-April, has been kickstarted early with the *Eerie Series*, and expanded to include Sundays. This month's *YesterWays* is dedicated to fingerweaving. Special thanks to master artist Carol James of Winnipeg, Canada for loaning us an assortment of exquisite samples of her artwork for display and reference during the workshops, including a remarkable replica sample of the sash supposedly presented to General Isaac Brock by Tecumseh in August 1812, currently in the collections of the Canadian War Museum.
- On Tuesday, October 1, Jill and I traveled to Toledo to appear on WTOL's morning show, *Good Day*, for an interview about *Octobernight* and other spookie-season-goings-on at the MCMS. Thanks to Producer Wendy Sheridan and host Amanda Fay.
- On Friday, October 11, 3rd and 4th grade students from Holy Ghost Lutheran visited Territorial Park and the County Museum for a field trip.
- On Tuesday, October 15, I met with members of the tourism bureau for an orientation and introduction to the MCMS and our community offerings.
- On Tuesday, October 22, pest bait stations were serviced at RRTP.
- On Wednesday, October 30, Andy and I met with Josh Adams, the new Academic Liaison for the River Raisin Battlefield, to get acquainted and brainstorm future programs together.

LOCAL HISTORY DIVISION Report

For the busy month of August, 2024

We were open by appointment for 11 visitors, 6 walk-ins, and 20 GSMC members.

Topics included the obituaries, genealogy such as Hoffman, Dunn, Cunningham, Brown, Woolford, Kibbie, Herkimer. Also World War II obits, Dundee schools, Spalding & Vivian families, MAECO, Ida Library, YMCA, Camp Fire Girls, Beck, Jitney bus. Residences of Spittaler, Ferry, Morton.

Rachel processed 35 obits from 13 requests. She handled 8 phone call requests and 18 emails. She continues to fill in at the front desk, answer requests, look up missing obits and topics.

Robert had 15 outside calls and answered 18 emails, and delivered transferred documents to the Detroit Public Library that had no Monroe connection: including Detroit related newspaper, photographs, negatives, Detroit Police Department materials, receipts, business papers, history books, mortgages and more documents.

He and staffer Nick delivered the harp (69.11.12.1) and damaged picture frame (2024.29.1) to Conservator Mark Gervasi on August 9th for conservation work. He updates us quite often with what he is doing.

A recent donation of a color 1901 Lang map (2024.35) was exchanged for the black/white one on display.

In preparation for the Probate court book move and anticipated racks, he helped remove and process the piles of items left in the old Exhibits office. He is also filling in at the front desk.

Staff received about 300 ledger books from the County Probate department on the 28th. We were fortunate to have Youth Center youth to help with the lifting and moving of the books. They were accompanied by two Youth Center staff, who kept the process going at the Courthouse and at the Museum. A big “Thanks” to Ms. Melissa Strong, Director of Juvenile Services/Probate Court Administrator as the ‘hub’ that made it happen, and all in one day as well!

Note: the early Probate books were taken from the courthouse to the state of Michigan at Lansing at some fairly recent time. The physical, and microfilm Indexes were also taken, so I don’t know what exactly we have, or how they will be useful if these volumes contain no indexes (update later as I examine the volumes.) The State charges \$40 for each Index search, plus the case file. I have long thought that when the State takes records from a county, there should be a copy and index left with that county, or free access to what was taken to Lansing. But that’s just me.

The Director, Deputy Director, Robert & I had a Collections meeting on the 13th for the month.

Rachel processed 4 obits from 8 requests. She handled 6 phone call requests and 15 emails. She continued to fill in at the front desk, answer requests, and retrieve missing obits. She also worked the OctoberNight event.

Rachel & I participated in the County Health Wellness Day at the courthouse.

Robert had 15 outside calls and answered 11 emails. He began processing 2024.49 scrapbooks, helped at the Navarre-Morris cabin renovation, processed more materials found in the exhibits workspace, brought back the preserved harp and took more items to Mark Gervasi.
